# Extra funding for safer streets

The Stockton Town Centre and Ropner ward areas are benefitting from over £300,000 from the Home Office's Safer Streets Fund.

The project aims to reduce levels of neighbourhood crime, violence against women and girls (VAWG) and anti-social behaviour.

The Safer Streets project will run until March 2025 and targets areas identified as crime and antisocial behaviour "hotspots" – neighbourhoods disproportionately and persistently affected by the types of crime covered by the fund.

Initiatives will include better street lighting, more CCTV, security measures for homeowners and and education and empowerment sessions for vulnerable women and girls.



# Heroic enforcement officers help save man's life

Two enforcement officers have been hailed as heroes after helping save a man's life on Stockton High Street.

Billy Stockton was visiting Stockton town centre before Christmas when he began to feel unwell. After being helped by enforcement officers Graeme Baverstock and Germaine Pereira (pictured), Billy's condition quickly deteriorated and he became unresponsive. Graeme and Germaine acted very quickly, with Germaine administering CPR whilst Graeme ran to collect a nearby defibrillator. After Billy was given several shocks on the defibrillator by Graeme, an ambulance crew arrived on scene.

Remarkably, Billy was already responsive by the time he got into the ambulance. And we are extremely pleased to report that he is now back home and continuing his recovery.

# Better Health at Work Award winners!

Stockton-on-Tees Borough Council has achieved the Better Health at Work Award (BHAWA), which recognises the efforts of employers in addressing health issues within the workplace, for a tenth consecutive year.

The Shared Lives scheme enables adults with additional needs to live in a supportive, welcoming home with a host family on a short or long-term basis.


And Carolyn said: "If you've got the time, love, patience, and commitment, go for it.

# Stockton-on-Tees Talks

A range of resources are available to help children across the Borough develop their communication skills before starting school.

The 'Stockton-on-Tees Talks' programme is led by the Council in partnership with Speech and Language UK and aims to help children with their talking and understanding of words.

Activities include Tots Talking, an eight-week programme delivered from our Family Hubs for parents and carers of two-year-olds. Parents attend weekly one-hour sessions without their child

Families have described how they feel more confident in supporting their child's early language.

One Mum had a "daunting" feeling before attending, but "was eased by the welcoming environment and friendly parenting workers".

Tots Talking sessions include watching and discussing video clips, top tips, and activity ideas to make and play.

Home carers help with a range of daily living tasks, such as getting washed and dressed, preparing meals, laundry and shopping.

Comfort Call is one of the Council's commissioned providers and can also help people like Mary get out in the community.

Mary has learning disabilities and was keen to make some new friends, so the team referred her to the Council's STEPS service, who supported Mary to attend a local 'Knit and Natter' group and a cooking class.

This has made a big difference to Mary and she has made lots of new friends.

sector. In this issue, we're looking at The
Headlight Project.

The Headlight Project aims to reduce the number of deaths by suicide in the Tees Valley area through therapy, preventative education, and training. We spoke with Katie Devereux, Project Lead and counsellor, about the charity.

"We have an established counselling service for adults and children, and we are currently developing a program of preventative education and training around suicide and suicide prevention," Katie said. "We are keen to develop more prevention services to help our local community with an understanding of suicide, its impact, and what we can do to help ourselves and others when struggling with mental health.

"There are so many things I love about the Headlight Project. I would say that what I love most is its message of hope. Our charity was born out of the most tragic circumstances when in 2018 our founder Catherine lost her husband Russ to suicide.

"Cath was determined and passionate about setting something up to provide support to people experiencing a similar fate to her own. Out of the darkest of times the Headlight Project was born, with a message of hope at its core which emanates through every fibre of the charity. Our strapline is "A guiding light when the road ahead is dark" and it could not be more fitting to the charity.

"If anyone is unsure whether they can access support from us, I would always encourage them to get in touch for a discussion. If we are not the right service, we can always look to signpost somewhere more appropriate."

# Reducing Inequalities Support Fund (RISF)

There's lots of work going on across the Borough to help improve the lives of our residents by tackling inequality and poverty.

Catalyst is an organisation that offers a range of specialist support to help other charities in Stockton-on-Tees improve and thrive. They have secured almost half a million pounds in National Lottery funding to support the work of A Fairer Stockton-on-Tees, and with this developed the Reducing Inequalities Support Fund (RISF).

The RISF offers grants up to £1,000 for organisations looking to expand or cover costs for a service aiming to reduce inequality in the Borough.

# New home energy efficiency scheme

A scheme has launched to provide grants to eligible homeowners to improve the energy efficiency of their homes.

The Home Energy Efficiency Tees Valley (HEET) programme can provide funding up to £18,000 per household for properties that don't have gas central heating.

Energy efficiency measures may include insulation, upgrading windows to double glazing, and installing new heating and renewable technologies such as air source heat pumps and solar panels. This is all free for qualifying residents.

To be eligible, homes must have an Energy Performance Certificate rating of D, E, F or G. You can go to www.gov.uk/find-energy-certificate to check yours.

HEET is a partnership scheme between Stockton-on-Tees Borough Council, Darlington Borough Council, Hartlepool Borough Council and Redcar and Cleveland Borough Council.

# **Transforming the Borough**





# A series of improvements to Norton High Street began at the end of February.

The plans include the creation of a northbound one-way system at the southern section of Norton High Street and improvements to extend pedestrianised areas. They will create more flexible spaces and allow new opportunities for further growth to an already thriving area, such as leisure activities, pop-up markets and outdoor seating. As part of this, six additional car or taxi spaces will be created on the High Street too. During the phases of work, a number of changes to the High Street will be in place. # Stockton Waterfront


Work has officially started on the construction of Stockton's bold, new urban park, marking the beginning of another major milestone in the Stockton Waterfront development.

The first phase of works includes the construction of a 55m land bridge structure, and extension of the existing Millennium Footbridge, which will provide uninterrupted access to the riverside from the High Street.

Meanwhile, new images of the transformational public space show a large-scale play area for all ages and a host of flexible spaces across the urban park.

The main play area's design has been influenced by the industrial heritage of the site, with two timber towers that are connected by walkways. Wheelchair accessible elements and a variety of features will make the play space as accessible as possible.

# Yarm Town Hall Heritage Centre completion

Yarm Town Hall Heritage Centre has officially opened following its refurbishment and transformation into an exhibition space.

The heritage centre will showcase a major new exhibition called 'Island in a River' featuring community memories and unique artefacts, which will be permanently on display, led by Artist Matthew Rosier and North Yorkshire-based media arts organisation Mediale.

The objects displayed inside the exhibition centrepiece include a replica iron age canoe, replica tenth century Viking Helmet and a lion statue from legendary nightclub Tall Trees.

At night, the exhibition will transform into a video installation projecting a looping holographic film of the River Tees and its many users, celebrating the powerful connection between the town and the river.

The external refurbishment and exhibition work was funded as part of the Council's successful application for £20million from the Levelling Up Fund for the Stockton South constituency, and has been led in partnership with Yarm Town Council.

# Dragon Fort feature completes impressive upgrades to Romano Park

Improvement works to Romano Park in Ingleby Barwick have been completed, including a revamped play area with a unique, 'dragon fort' feature, which is the first of its kind.

Children from Barley Fields Primary School gave the play area their seal of approval at the official opening back in January. The dragon's features include a climbing wall, net and rock climber, a slide, balancing discs and intricate play panels.

A community growing area on the site and a planting scheme with trees, shrubs and benches are also part of the overall improvements. There is also improved access to the platform near the Barwick Pond nature reserve and a remarking of the Multi Use Games Area.



# Billingham receives £20million of Levelling Up funding

Billingham has been awarded £20million from the Government's Levelling Up Fund in a major boost to the Council's regeneration plans for the town centre.

The bid formed part of the ongoing town centres investment programme led by the Council, with a masterplan for Billingham currently being prepared to explore potential redevelopment opportunities in the town.

The masterplan will build on the previous findings from the 'Let's Talk About Our Towns' public consultation in 2020, assess potential opportunities for future development and consider how they can be delivered alongside the owners of the town centre.

Work has officially started on a new, modern extension to Preston Park Museum which will create a space for nationally significant touring exhibitions and loans.

The Mayor of Stockton-on-Tees, Councillor Jim Beall unveiled a plaque to commemorate work beginning before putting the first spade in the ground.

He said: "I am delighted to be on site to mark the start of this ambitious project at Preston Park, the Council's jewel in the crown.

"This development will create an inspiring visitor experience fit for future generations, improving cultural experiences and at the same time celebrating the importance of our heritage.

"It's brilliant that the new extension will enable nationally significant touring exhibitions and loans to come to our Borough for our communities to experience and enjoy."

Work to the extension of the car park behind Butterfly World to provide almost 100 additional spaces will begin in the spring. Wider park improvements, including a new café and toilets, repurposing of the aviary and new interpretation to highlight the Stockton & Darlington Railway story along the original trackbed will be available in the coming months.

# Improvements to your waste and recycling collections

Household waste and recycling collections are to be improved across Stockton-on-Tees to better meet residents' needs, help the environment and save money in the long term.

Members of Stockton-on-Tees Borough Council's Cabinet have approved recommendations from an extensive scrutiny review carried out by a cross party committee of Councillors.

It means weekly recycling collections and the introduction of a new weekly food waste collection in line with national legislation which will make this compulsory from 2026. Residual waste will be collected fortnightly and the Council's green waste collection will be reviewed in line with updated Government guidance.

Assistant Director for Community Services and Transport, Craig Willows, said: "Residents won't see any changes until April 2026 but before then we will engage with residents about recycling equipment like bags, boxes and food caddies to ensure that our residents can effectively access the new service changes that will be delivered across the borough."




# Protecting our natural environment

In the last edition of Stockton-on-Tees News we updated you on our ambitious ten-year Environmental Sustainability and Carbon Reduction Strategy and how we are working to achieve the four key aims of the plan.

## They are:

- 1. Achieve net zero greenhouse gas emissions as a Council
- 2. Protect and enhance the natural environment
- 3. Use all resources efficiently and minimise waste
- 4. Adapt to the impact of climate change





The Council has set up four climate coalitions:

· Business · Communities · Creative · Youth

The aim of each coalition is to bring people and organisations together and work collaboratively to help the Borough to deliver the Government's 'net zero target'. That means achieving a balance between the carbon emitted into the atmosphere, and the carbon removed from it.

Each coalition is tasked with forming an action plan of activities to help reach the target and create the best possible environment for the next generation.

Last winter's 'Trees in Stockton-on-Tees' initiative saw many more local school groups, volunteers, organisations and businesses plant thousands of trees across the

This is the third wave of the ambitious project which aims to plant around 24,000 new trees across Stockton-on-Tees, working alongside UK charity Trees for Cities and other partners, to improve communities and help tackle climate change.

The special event coincided with COP 28, the United Nations Climate Change Conference taking place in Dubai.

COP stands for "Conference of the Parties", where the "parties" are the countries that signed up to the UN climate agreement in 1992.


The Youth COP event at Arc was organised by the Youth Climate Coalition, chaired by our multi award-winning youth-led movement Bright Minds Big Futures (BMBF).

Billingham became the UK's first area to get new environmentally sustainable roads, thanks to a partnership between the Council and Tarmac. Laid by Tarmac, Marsh House Avenue and Whitehouse Road are now the UK's lowest carbon emission roads after they were resurfaced with recycled material made from old roads. The surfaces were also mixed at lower temperatures to save carbon.

The cutting-edge technology used, which included a fossil fuel alternative to power the manufacturing plant used to make the asphalt, has reduced carbon emissions on the project by up to 80 per cent compared to traditional methods.



# Care and Health Zone Masterplanner appointed

Plans to create a nationally significant social care and health zone at Teesdale Business Park and the nearby Tees Marshalling Yards have taken a step forward.

The Council has appointed Arup Group Ltd to develop a masterplan for the area which will make up the Care and Health Innovation Zone.

The masterplan will take into account uses for the site and will consider social care and health services, sector-specific businesses, research, teaching and learning facilities and housing to meet local needs.

It will also provide a long-term strategy for the site and consider the best way to transform it into a vibrant and successful place, whilst contributing to the reduction of health inequalities in the Borough and Tees Valley.

# What you need to know

# First-past-the-post

Both elections now use the first-past-the-post voting system, where you vote for a single candidate, and the candidate with the most votes wins the election.

# **Register to vote**

You must be registered to vote at these elections. It's quick and easy to register to vote online by visiting www.gov.uk/register-to-vote. You need to have done this by midnight on Tuesday 16 April 2024. If you can't register online, please contact our Voter Registration Helpline on 01642 526196 and we will arrange a paper application for you.

# **Voting in person**

You can find out where your polling station is by checking your poll card, which will be delivered to you in advance of the election, or by checking on **www. wheredoivote.co.uk**. The polling stations are open from 7am to 10pm on polling day.

Please note that you will need a valid form of photo ID to vote in person. You can check the accepted forms of ID on www.stockton.gov.uk/voter-id. If you haven't got a valid photo ID, you'll need to apply for a Voter Authority Certificate (VAC). You can apply for a free VAC on the Government's website: www.gov.uk/applyfor-photo-id-voter-authority-certificate. You'll need to do this before 5pm on Wednesday 24 April 2024.



# Voting by post or by proxy

You can apply for a postal vote and join 47,000 others in the Borough who have already registered. With a postal vote, all you need to do is pop your vote in a Royal Mail post box. If you want a postal vote for these elections, make sure you apply early. This must be done before 5pm on Wednesday 17 April. You can apply at www.gov.uk/apply-postal-vote.

Voting by proxy means that you appoint someone you trust to vote on your behalf and it is a convenient way of voting if you are unable to get to the polling station. You can apply at www.gov.uk/apply-proxy-vote. If you are unable to apply online please contact the Voter Registration Helpline on 01642 526196 to register a proxy vote before 5pm on Wednesday 24 April 2024.



# New ways of working to power the Borough's future

Councillors met last month to agree the budget for the coming financial year and set the Medium Term Financial Plan up to 2029.

A Council Tax increase of 4.95 per cent, which is made up of 2.95 per cent on core Council services and 2 per cent on the Government's adult social care levy was agreed.

Increased demand for Council services, uncertain funding streams and high levels of inflation mean the Council needs to spend £9million less by 2026/27.

Despite these challenges, the Council is confident that by working with its partners and communities in different ways it can put in place new approaches which will not only save money, but also reshape what it does for the better and in the best interests of residents.

It's exploring new ways of working through a planned programme of transformation called 'Powering our Future'.

A key strand of 'Powering our Future' is the ambitious regeneration plans in each of the Borough's town centres, which continue to progress very well and will attract more businesses leading to a growth in business rates as well as generating employment opportunities. You can read more about the progress of the regeneration schemes on pages 10 and 11.

Meanwhile 14 transformation reviews are underway across a number of different areas of the authority, including administration and business services, waste collection, children in our care and fleet management. Although all of these reviews won't come to a conclusion at the same time, the Council expects to start seeing the results of the new ways of working next financial year.

It was also agreed that homes stood empty and substantially unfurnished for one to five years would be charged a 100 per cent Council Tax premium - and this would go up to 200 per cent for five to 10 years and 300 per cent for anything over 10 years. This is to encourage empty homes to be brought back in to use.

The Council is also looking more broadly at how it can work more closely with the communities in the Borough and its partners to change the way it works to ensure residents are at the heart of everything it does. An example of how this is working already is through the 'Making it Real Board', you can read about that on page 4.



# **Local Plan to be reviewed**

The Council's current Local Plan sets out policies and proposals to guide planning decisions and establishes a framework for sustainable economic growth and development in the Borough which includes areas for new housing, employment land, new infrastructure and enhancement of our natural and historic environment.

In January, Council made the decision to begin the preparatory work for a new Local Plan. The process to create a new plan will not formally commence until government reforms of the planning system are brought in to force. Until that point work will focus on evidence gathering and targeted engagement. In the intervening period the current Local Plan remains in force and will be used to make decisions on planning applications.

Opportunities for residents and businesses to comment on the Local Plan will be provided and we will provide details of how those with an interest can register their interest soon.





# Thanks for your views!

A big thank you to everyone who completed our residents survey. More than 2,600 people took the time to answer our questions, giving us a great representation geographically and across different communities.

The questions were based on the well-researched Measures of National Wellbeing launched by the Office for National Statistics (ONS), which will allow us to compare Stockton-on-Tees to the regional and national picture released by the ONS on a quarterly basis.

The results locally will inform how we work with our communities and help to shape the future of the Borough to make sure it is a great place for everyone to live and

work. You will see more information on this on the coming months.

Paige Deputy Team Manager of Adult Safeguarding

"The most rewarding part of my job is making a difference to the lives of residents. Seeing smiles appear on the faces of individuals who never imagined their circumstances could change and improve, brings me fulfilment."

Paige is the Deputy Team Manager of Adult Safeguarding and has worked for the Council since 2017. Her day-to-day role sees her receive referrals from different agencies with concerns of abuse, neglect and exploitation.

"The team receive referrals from a range of partner agencies including the Police, health services, care and support organisations and Council commissioned services including domestic abuse service, Harbour, and substance recovery service, Change Grow Live, and many more. From there, we will assess the individual's circumstances and work with other agencies to support the person to feel safe and protected from harm."

Paige enjoys supporting people from a wide range of backgrounds and finds helping them be safe and happy after difficult circumstances extremely rewarding. She appreciates that no two days are the same in her role and helping those in need achieve the "impossible" is why she loves her job.

"The focus of the team is to ensure that people's voices are heard, and their views are respected. To maintain an open line of communication with those requiring support is crucial."

In the next five years, Paige wants to continue to build on the strengths of the team and promote the service to make people aware that the service is here to help. Currently, she's studying to become an Approved Mental Health Professional which will deepen her knowledge and help her to carry out further functions under the Mental Health Act in order to safeguard people.

"I am grateful to have a brilliant team supporting me as I pursue further development. Being a point of contact for vulnerable adults is a crucial responsibility and my studies are allowing me to enhance my knowledge so I can help guide the team in providing the very best safeguarding support."


